

Entrepreneurship Class

In 2019, we launched a 10-week entrepreneurship course conducted by Derrin Leppek the Director of the Center for Social Entrepreneurship at the University of Detroit Mercy. Thanks to this educational opportunity, our residents can now learn valuable business skills that will put them on a path to financial independence. Specifically, they learn how to go from concept to execution by developing a business model, a marketing plan, pricing strategy and a financing model. They also learn basic legal issues related to entrepreneurship.



Body, Mind and Spirit Seminar

A new Body, Mind and Spirit Seminar was launched by our medical team! The seminar includes sessions on critically important information that covers wide ranging topics related to healing from the inside out.

- Body physical health care and prevention topics including reproductive health, sexually transmitted infections, normal body changes with aging, nutrition, exercise, skin and oral care.
- Mind brain function and psychology topics including normal neuropathways, changes secondary to addiction, post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, and anxiety.
- Spirit spirituality definitions, values, and integration into personal life.

All of our residents participated in the seminar and we are excited to host it again in 2020!

Other Program Highlights

- Grief and Loss Individual Therapy Sessions were started
- We hosted our first 'Friends and Family Day'
- Our Executive Director and Case Manager became federally certified by the Department of Health and Human Services for Human Trafficking Training
- We were able to provide all of our residents with YMCA memberships

Who We Are

Located in metro Detroit, Sanctum House is a comprehensive, residential program for women survivors of human trafficking. By providing 24-hour on-site care and support, we help survivors overcome trauma and addiction while empowering them with the life skills necessary to achieve a healthy, productive and independent life.

What We Do

Our up to 24-month residential program for females 18 years of age or older provides wrap around services to address physical, psychological, emotional, educational and spiritual needs necessary to overcome trauma and move towards a happy, healthy productive future.

We provide therapy and trauma care, health and wellness resources, educational opportunities, vocational skills and job training. Additionally, through our direct services and partnerships with over 30 key community allies, survivors have access to:

- Medical, Dental and Vision Care
- Job Placement and Training
- GED Completion
- Computer Skills Training
- College Courses
- Legal Assistance and Identity Protection
- Health and Wellness Coaching
- Addiction Recovery
- Opportunities for Spiritual Growth
- Financial Education
- Self-defense Training and Safety Awareness
- Respite Activities: yoga, crafts, hiking, gardening, etc.

We also conduct community education and outreach to create awareness about human trafficking in hopes of reaching more victims.

AN EPIDEMIC

From January I to December 31, 2018 (the most recent data available), the National Human Trafficking Hotline was contacted over 1,000 times from right here in Michigan. Sadly, due to underreporting by certain demographics and lack of awareness of the hotline, we know that this number and those below are just the tip of the iceberg.





The key to bringing the parade and the Color Run and more back to downtown Farmington has been that community effort and a partnership between the city and DDA to hire an event manager.


