Underground Railroad

In 1786 George Washington complained about how one of his runaway slaves was helped by a "society of Quakers, formed for such purposes." The nameless system kept growing until it finally was given a name by Thomas Smallwood, African-American activist, writer and former slave. The name was: the Underground Railroad.

Born into slavery outside Washington, D.C., in 1801 – the same year Nathan Power was born! – Smallwood largely educated himself and bought his own freedom when he was 30. Once free, he ran a shoemaking business by day from the little house he shared with his wife and four children a short walk from the U.S. Capitol. By night, he was organizing daring escapes from slavery — not by ones and twos, but by the wagonload — from Washington, Baltimore and the surrounding counties.

Somehow, he found time to write a dispatch for an abolitionist newspaper in Albany, N.Y. In his August 10, 1842, column, he credited owners themselves whose cruelty made slaves "disappear by that ... 'under ground rail-road' or steam balloon' people were blaming when their property walked off, leaving no trace." He also referred to the owners as "man stealers" and once mocked a slaveholder whose "walking property walked off." He would use names of the slaveholders but never identified himself – for good reason.

Guest speaker, Peggy Castine gave a very good history of early Farmington with emphasis on Nathan Power who organized the Underground RR in this area.
